HW : For next time choose three members of your family, friends or neighbours who do different jobs and find out how to say the name of their job in English. You need to know the names of the occupations of the people who live with you.

Class activity

Preparation : read the worksheet. Make sure you understand the words in the different boxes. Decide which boxes correspond to your three jobs.

Remember, your jobs may correspond to more than one box for example a salesperson works in a shop, an electrician might work on a building site.

Task : speaking only English talk to the other members of the class to find out which jobs they have on their list. E.g. « do you have a salesperson on your list?». If they **do**, they should answer “yes my mother / neighbour / cousin is a secretary” **and** give you some *additional information* for example “she works for a doctor” or “she works in a hospital”. Make a note of the pupil's name and additional information in the corresponding box if you get a positive answer. (You may only complete ONE box: e.g. you must choose either secretary OR “works in a hospital” if they are both possible. Then your partner asks you a question and you answer... then swap partners. NB you may only ask ONE question each before you swap partners.

Your aim: to be the first person to complete a row of six answers horizontally, vertically or diagonally.

Teacher's notes:

depending on how quickly the fastest ones get 6 answers you can keep the activity going by sending them back to complete another line and award a win to the first person to get a diagonal, a horizontal line AND a vertical line.... or a complete grid, although this may not be possible depending on their chosen occupations.

Other activities: send the winners off to make a list of what the people in their complete line **do** (5 things e.g. a teacher prepares lessons, a teacher works in a school, a teacher marks work, a teacher writes reports, a teacher helps their pupils). Also possible HW activity

Debriefing: ask “who is a doctor?” volunteer answers “Marie's Mum is a doctor, she works in Parthenay hospital”... then the volunteer asks a question for one of the answers they didn't find. If no one can answer then a pupil who has an occupation on their list that is not listed in a box can put up their hand and volunteer the information: “My nextdoor neighbour is an astronomer.”

Further activity:

Write the workplaces on the board as headings: hospital / school / factory / office / shop / building site / hotel- restaurant / vehicle

Four teams / each team has a different coloured boardmarker and they must write as many different jobs for each workplace as they can think of ... but they can only write one job, then they have to pass the marker to another team member... team members brainstorm, make notes and look for inspiration in what other pupils have written – for example if the red team have written “gardener” under school, then the blue team can write it under hospital etc. (an electrician can work in a factory but also in a school or on a building site.)

Classification by endings: journalist / dentist / receptionist; technician / electrician / beautician; doctor / author / (vendor); writer / builder / plumber
