The Quick How to Write a Speech Checklist

Before you begin writing your speech you need:

- Your speech OUTLINE with your main ideas ranked in the order you're going to present them. If you haven't done one complete this 4 step sample speech outline. It will make the writing process much easier.
- Your RESEARCH
- You also need to know WHO you're speaking to, the PURPOSE of the speech and HOW long you're speaking for

Basic Speech Construction

Your speech will have three parts: an opening or introduction, the body where you present your main ideas and an ending.

Split your time allowance so that you spend approximately 70% on the body and 15% each on the introduction and ending.

How to write a speech

- Write your main ideas out incorporating your examples and research
- Link them together making sure each flows in a smooth, logical progression
- Write your ending, summarizing your main ideas briefly and end with a call for action
- Write your introduction considering the 'hook' you're going to use to get your audience listening
- An often quoted saying to explain the process is: Tell them what you're going to tell them (Introduction) Tell them (Body of your speech the main ideas plus examples) Tell them what you told them (The ending)

TEST before presenting. Read aloud several times to check the flow of material, the suitability of language and the timing.
